
## How does our garden grow?

.....the weeds still rapidly, but our elite volunteers keep them at bay with intermittent assaults. More volunteers are still very welcome so please let us know if you are interested however green your fingers may be, we even sometimes get time for a cup of tea. The shrubs (guelder rose, berberis, periwinkle, cotoneaster and euonymus) are establishing and spreading out nicely. The fruit trees donated from Logie Coldstone School are surviving okay, although we would appreciate any expertise on these. We are pruning them to keep them compact and resistant to the winds. We have not added too much, apart from Aberdeenshire Council's donation of colourful annuals, a few donations on the west side, and some cuttings and small lavender plugs, as we experiment with alpine type plants and those that don't mind free draining soil. As time progresses the aim is to fill the beds with more and more low maintenance, yet attractive and wildlife friendly weed-suppressing plants. We planted some spring bulbs in what felt like gale force winds on the last weekend in October, with a stalwart collection of trusty volunteers, and we are looking forward to a colourful show next year. Also, of course, we now have an outside water tap, a real boon for the gardening. Yeah! Here's to a kind winter.....

# Logie Coldstone School

It has been another action packed year at Logie Coldstone Primary School. August saw us welcome three primary ones to the school: Millie Mann, Dougal Mather and Rosie Davies. The primary one to four class now have Miss Taylor who took over from Mrs Findlay when she retired. Miss Taylor has just qualified as a teacher and brings with her lots of enthusiasm and fresh ideas. Mrs Findlay had taught at the school for fifteen years so it was only fitting that she received a good send off. Her many farewell gifts included a personalised leavers hoody!



One of the highlights of the year was the Coldstone quiz team coming first in the Aboyne cluster Rotary Club quiz. This allowed them to progress through to the second stage held in Portlethen. After a valiant effort and tough competition we were delighted to come third. Our team scored only two less points than the winners: out of a possible 120 available they managed a very respectable 113. We are very proud of our little school.

One of our pupils, Lachlan Castleton, is a keen participant in Sooyang Do and recently acquired his green belt; he has sat a total of seven gradings. He proved his fitness and determination when he took part in a twelve hour charity 'focusmittathon'. He raised an amazing total of £150 for CLAN.

The Tarland Flower Show is a big part of the area's diary and many of the youngsters enjoy entering the various gardening, cookery and craft competitions. Pearl Murphy was delighted to win first prize for her chocolate brownies! Her sister Alice won a first for her close-up photo of some daisies. The star of the show was Logie Coldstone Primary's very own Hafwen Dobson-Allam. She won the Prize Cup for the Industrial and Craft section.

Primary sevens, Daniel and Mary Farquhar played a large part in the proceedings of this year's Logie Coldstone Fun Games. Mary is excellent on the pipes and had the honour of piping in the games, along with our Coldstone piping group. Her brother Daniel was in top form during the races and took away the AG and JJ Smith Memorial Cup.
