Logie Coldstone Trust is a registered charity which aims to foster active citizenship and community development. The Trust owns and manages Logie Coldstone Hall and is run entirely by volunteers.

The hall underwent major refurbishment in 2013. This year hall facilities have been enhanced by the purchase of a laptop and printer/scanner. This, along with our satellite broadband connection, has made it easier for people to come together to work on Trust activities, e.g. producing the newsletter and preparing funding applications. It has also allowed Trust and hall related documents to be archived and stored electronically. Kitchen facilities have been improved through the purchase of a dishwasher, fridge and freezer. These additions have made it easier to cater for community events including the ever popular monthly community café. The Trust was grateful to receive a donation of outdoor seating and tables from a local resident. Grant funding from Etape Royale Cycle Race and the Marr Area Top Up Fund enabled the Trust to purchase plants and the hall garden and outdoor area has been transformed into an attractive and popular space to enjoy some of our activities. A further donation to the Trust allowed for the purchase of more chairs which arrived, after a nail-biting afternoon, just minutes before the start of Aly and Phil's sell-out concert!

We hope you enjoy reading about our various community events and activities which highlight our resourceful, active and connected community.



Putting the Coldstone back into Logie Coldstone

Do you ever wonder how the place name 'Logie Coldstone' came about?

In 1618 the parishes of Logie-Mar and Coldstone were brought together to form Logie Coldstone.



The parish ministers from Logie-Mar and Coldstone set off from their respective kirks and the point at which they met became the location of a new kirk for the unified parish of Logie Coldstone. The parish of Logie-Mar included the area to the south of present day Logie Coldstone incorporating Blelack, Balnastraid, Ordie, Davan, Riven, Greystone and Leys. The parish of Coldstone is nearer present day Logie Coldstone and included the Newton, Kinaldie, Parks, Loanhead, Pitline, Knocksoul, and Balgrennie.

The name 'Logie' may be derived from the Gaelic word 'lagan' which means a hollow or low lying land. This 'Logie' was distinguished from the many others named 'Logie' by referring to it as Logie-Mar and sometimes, in earlier times, Logie Ruthvan. The old name of Logie Ruthvan was echoed in the name 'Ha' of Logie Rothwayne', the name given to the medieval fortification on the banks of Loch Davan, the site of which can still be distinguished. The site is listed on the RCHAMS web site. The first documented reference to 'Coldstone' seems to have been in 1275 AD in the old taxation records. It was recorded then as Col-essan (meaning corner of much water) but over the years was also recorded in many different forms, the final one for the Parish being Colquholdstone. It has also been suggested that the current name might come from the more similar sounding col-struan (corner of many streams). The church itself, which has now long gone stood on a hill, Kirkhill, as it is recorded on maps, next to the Coldstone graveyard.

Logie Coldstone School



It has been another busy, productive and fun year at our school.

Once a month the younger class have hosted the toddler group. The pupils have loved putting on plays, doing craft activities, playing games and reading to the little ones. This is an example of the unique family atmosphere that runs throughout the whole school.

This past year, the school has con-

tinued to hold a special place in the heart of the community. A fundraising family bingo night was well attended by locals and it was fabulous fun. Again, the community showed their support and generosity by coming to the 'soup lunch'. The children showed great entrepreneurial spirit by growing their own vegetables and producing their own delicious soups from the harvest. The lunch raised funds for Mary's Meals which helps provide food for children less fortunate. Our children showed their caring sides again when they collected pet treats, food, toys and bedding to donate to the SSPCA when they came to the school to tell us about the valuable work they do.

When the school held an open morning it was lovely to see what the children had been working on. Indeed, there was some role-reversal when parents had the opportunity to take part in lessons that the children had done in class!

Mrs Hayward has been bringing the exciting world of science to life on Mondays and this term we have welcomed Ms Andrusyszyn to the p5-7 class. As ever, music and drama have been a great confidence boost for many children and the pupils shone in their production of Sleepy Beauty. Visiting music teachers have provided the opportunity to study the fiddle or cello and Mrs Constable has engaged the whole school

with music classes.

We also have some talented artists at the school. For the third year running, one of our pupils has won a place in the SCARF calendar competition which is open to all pupils in the North East of Scotland and promotes energy efficiency. Daniel Farquhar and Alice Murphy have been previous winners; this year the honour goes to Pearl Murphy. The lucky winners are invited to be guests at The Scottish Parliament in Edinburgh.



This term is always exciting with the build-up to Christmas! The children welcome everyone to their Nativity play on the 15th December in the hall and they will celebrate the end of term with a party. Per-

Logie Coldstone badminton club is a competitive but very friendly badminton club that welcomes players, young and old, of all levels.


Absolute beginners, social players, regular players are all welcome. Rackets available to borrow if needed. Sessions are £3 per player per time and are pay as you go.

Behind the recycling bins, the evergreens are off to a slow start so we have companioned them with geraniums and are hoping for more vigorous growth next year. Also we have planted daffodils, bluebells and tulips for a spring show. Many thanks for grants from various bodies and all the volunteers' hard work.
